Letter from the Chairperson

To: Interim Superintendent/President Brock McMurray Members of the Board of Trustees Citizens of the West Kern Community College District

As Chairperson of the West Kern Community College District Independent Citizens Oversight Committee (the Committee), I am pleased to submit this report to the Board of Trustees (the Board) of the West Kern Community College District (WKCCD, the District). As stated in the West Kern Community College District Citizens' Oversight Committee Charter, this report states whether or not the District is in compliance with Article XIIIA, Section 1(b) 3 of the California Constitution. It also summarizes the major topics dealt with by the Committee during the last twelve months.

I would like to thank my fellow Committee members for their time and efforts in overseeing the District's long-term construction and facilities improvement project. Thanks to the passage of Measure A in 2004 and the proper usage of the revenues generated per the language of the bond, the face of Taft College is changing to reflect its vision, mission and values.

I also wish to thank those members of the District staff who continue to work with us to set up the processes to ensure that independent oversight of the project is possible.

The Committee is pleased with the progress made during this fiscal year on all current Measure A bond projects: Specifically, the completion of the Ash Street dormitory facilities renovation. This project updated dorm rooms and the surrounding areas to improve the oncampus living experience for Taft College students. The project was completed in two phases, the first phase being completed prior to the beginning of the fall, 2014 semester, and the second semester being completed in January, 2015, prior to the spring semester. Along with the modernization of the on-campus dormitories, this project will allow for the removal of the T-dorms, in anticipation of the new Student Center project, which is scheduled to begin in 2016.

As the appointed voice of the Citizens Oversight Committee, I would like to state that the Committee looks forward to continuing its efforts to ensure that "Measure A" bond revenues are spent judiciously and to keep the Taft community informed on the progress of the projects.

Annual Report

July 1, 2014 - June 30, 2015

I. Description of "Measure A":

In the March 2, 2004 general election, the West Kern Community College District presented Measure A to the District's voters on the ballot. Measure A requested approval to issue \$39,800,000 in general obligation bonds, with the proceeds from the sale of the bonds to be used for financing the District's long-term construction and facilities improvement project. The wording on the 2004 ballot consisted of:

Measure A. Campus Expansion -- West Kern Community College District

To improve the quality of education at Taft College, shall the West Kern Community College District be authorized to upgrade and expand the campus, provide vocational labs and programs in science and healthcare to produce a trained workforce, improve access to computers and technology, construct a library media center for community use, and build classrooms, by issuing \$39,800,000 in bonds, within legal interest rates, with annual audits, a citizens' oversight committee and no money for teacher or administrators' salaries?

In compliance with Proposition 39 of 2000, a 55% approval was required to pass Measure A. The voters of the District passed the bond measure with a 58.1% vote count.

II. Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee:

At July 1, 2014, the following persons held positions on the Citizens' Bond Oversight Committee (COC, or the Committee) appointed by the Board of Trustees:

There is also a Student Representative Member position on the COC Board, assigned as a 1-year term which is tied to the academic calendar. The position was filled by Adam Hightower at the November 5, 2014 COC meeting. Mr. Hightower did not hold an office with the Taft College Associated Student Body Organization (ASB) for the 2014/2015 academic year but volunteered as an ASB student trustee.

The previous Student Representative was Ms. Celia Rangel. Ms. Rangel did not hold a Taft College Associated Student Body Organization (ASB) office for the 2013/2014 academic year but volunteered as an ASB representative. Ms. Rangel served the full term and resigned her position after the May 7, 2014 meeting.

There have been no changes in committee members since the 2013/2014 fiscal year. On April 14, 2014, Mr. Emmanuel Campos resigned his position based upon his appointment to the West Kern Community College Board of Trustees. On May 14, 2014, at their regular monthly meeting, the District board of trustees elected Dr. Loretta Lipscomb to fill the position vacated by Mr. Campos. The Citizens Oversight Committee roster has remained unchanged since May, 2014.

At June 30, 2015, the following persons held positions on the Citizens Oversight Committee (COC, or the Committee) appointed by the Board of Trustees:

-Larry Buttke Advisory Council/Foundation Representative

-Don Koenig At-Large Representative

The Committee does not make decisions regarding the use of "Measure A" funds, but it does inform the public of bond revenue expenditures. To carry out its stated purpose, the following duties are set forth in the West Kern Community College District Citizens Oversight Committee Charter:

Inform the public concerning information regarding the District's expenditures of revenues received from the sale of "Measure A" approved bonds.

Review expenditures to ensure that the bond proceeds are expended only for purposes set forth in the ballot measure and ensure that no bond proceeds are used for teacher or administrative salaries or other operating expenses.

The Committee shall present to the Board of Trustees an Annual Report in written format which shall include a statement indicating whether the District is in compliance with the requirements of Article XIIIA, Section 1(b) 3 of the California Constitution; and a summary of the Committee's proceedings and activities of the preceding fiscal year.

III. Meetings:

The COC held its organizational meeting on July 29, 2004. The following issues were discussed and adopted where necessary: Format, membership of board members, length of terms, and schedules for future meetings.

The COC meets quarterly at the West Kern Community College District office. Project updates are provided at each meeting with financial reports by District staff, along with performance presentations from District consultants on topics of project planning, execution and completion. Agendas are developed from board member's request for data and staff input.

The dates for the quarterly COC meetings for the 2014/2015 fiscal year were established per the July 28, 2005 meeting where it was agreed to reschedule the meeting dates to the first Wednesday of the second month immediately following the end of each quarter, unless otherwise noted. The meeting time will remain at 4:00 p.m. The 2014/2015 meeting dates were:

November 5, 2014

May 6, 2015

February 4, 2015

August 11, 2015

All agendas and minutes are posted at the District office and on the District website. Meetings are held in accordance with the Ralph M. Brown Act (Open Meeting Laws).

IV. Activities of the Committee:

The following are activities that the COC regularly participates in:

Approval of minutes from prior COC meetings.

The Committee reviews budget and construction project performance analysis reports presented by AP Architects. For the 2014/2015 fiscal year all presentations have been made by Mr. Kevin Cobb, Mr. Jose Vargas, Principal Architects of AP Architects, both assigned to the project, or Mr. Richard Treese, Planner for AP Architects. The quarterly financial reports and reconciliation to the County Fund for "Measure A" revenues are presented by WKCCD Administrative Services management personnel.

The Committee takes periodic tours of the construction projects. In this manner, they are able to see what the District and architects' details have been reporting. Any questions or concerns can be discussed on the sites so that a full understanding of all projects is achieved.

Any changes in the status or budgets of the projects are discussed openly and fully to the satisfaction of the COC.

V. Establishment of Committee Member Terms:

Establishment of terms for COC Members as well as voting for continuation of membership or replacement of members due to expiration of term or resignation of members is the duty of the WKCCD Board of Trustees. All original COC Members drew lots to determine the initial terms of their membership. All lots were for 1 or 2 year assignments, running from July 1 to June 30. The WKCCD Citizens Oversight Committee Charter originally stated that all members may serve a maximum of two consecutive terms. At the May 10, 2007 WKCCD Board of Trustees meeting, the originally established COC member term rulings were revised, eliminating the maximum two (2) term limitation.

On August 14, 2013, the WKCCD Board of Trustees voted to update the charter to include language identifying each term as 4 years, and limiting a committee member to a 3-term limit.

Terms for the Student Representative that were originally set as 1 year terms due to the nature of the position remained unchanged. The position is open to resignation of the member and replacement as needed based upon the situation and needs of the member student.

VI. Committee Leadership

At the first Committee meeting held on July 29, 2004, Neil Sawyer was elected Chairperson and Dawn Cole elected Vice Chair. Mr. Sawyer served as Chairperson until July 1, 2013. Upon his resignation due to term-limit restrictions, on August 7, 2013, Mr. Roger Miller was elected Chairperson. Mrs. Cole served as Vice Chair from 2004 until relinquishing her seat during the 2009/2010 fiscal year to accept a position on the West Kern Community College Board of Trustees. Mr. Don Koenig was subsequently elected Vice Chair. Mr. Koenig vacated the Vice Chair position on July 1, 2013, when his extended representation and service reached term limit restrictions. This vacancy was filled by the election of Mr. Larry Buttke at the August 7, 2013 quarterly meeting.

VII. Projects

There are currently 25 various capital improvement projects ranging from utility and technology upgrades to remodel of current campus facilities and new construction of facilities budgeted through "Measure A" funds. As of June 30, 2015, the following information summarizes the status of the "Measure A" projects:

VIII. Audit:

As dictated by state law, the "Measure A" bond requires a financial and performance audit which examines the usage of the bond funds. The firm of Rex A. Phinney, Certified Public Accountant, audited the "Measure A" Bond program for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2015. This report was presented to the WKCCD Board on January 13, 2016, and will be presented to the Citizen's Oversight Committee during the February 3, 2016 meeting. Copies of the audit reports are available at the District Business Services office. Both audits were supportive of the program and its management.

The auditor's report gave an unmodified opinion that the financial statements presented fairly, "in all material respects, the financial position of the General Obligation Bond Fund (Proposition 39) of the West Kern Community College District at June 30, 2015, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America."

In regards to the performance audit, the auditor's report noted no instances of noncompliance with the terms of Proposition 39 or "Measure A". The auditor's conclusion was that "the West Kern Community College District has properly accounted for the expenditures held in the General Obligation Bond Fund and that such expenditures were made for authorized bond projects." Nothing examined came to auditor's attention to indicate that the District did not implement appropriate management controls to ensure the bond proceeds are administered economically and effectively.

IX. Statement of Compliance:

Based on the information provided by the District, the Committee finds that as of this reporting period of July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015, the District is in compliance with the standards of Article XIIIA Section 1(b)(3)(c) of the California State Constitution and the terms of the original bond ballot.

President White announced the Annual School Trustees Winter Dinner meeting of the Kern County School Boards Association and the Kern County Superintendent of Schools Office is scheduled for February 29, 2016, at the Double Tree Hotel in Bakersfield. QUARTERLY INVESTMENT REPORT

District Investment Advisor Mike Urner distributed and reviewed the quarterly report of the WKCCD General Obligation Bond Portfolio and Facilities Reserve for the quarter ending December 31, 2015 (copies attached to the official minutes). Mr. Urner reviewed the highlights of the Facilities Reserve including income for the quarter of \$99,844.33 with a withdrawal of \$1,408,684.00 for the District's long term obligations. The ending value was \$13,100,245.83 with a projected 12-month portfolio coupon income of \$333,132.00 and \$4,199,589.95 total income earned since inception. Mr. Urner reviewed the asset and credit sector allocation and the portfolio maturity distribution, as well as confirming continuing compliance with state code and regulations.

The General Obligation Bond Portfolio was also reviewed. Mr. Urner reported that the GO Bond Portfolio gained income of \$56,036.63 for the quarter with an ending value of \$12,054,839.20. The projected 12-month portfolio coupon income is \$236,874.00 with \$4,762,305.00 total income earned since inception. Mr. Urner reviewed the asset and credit sector allocation and the portfolio maturity distribution, as well as confirming continuing compliance with state code and regulations. He noted with increasing interest rates we can anticipate a good amount of calls on the bonds owned by the District. He added that the Treasury rates are declining due to the current low price of oil and general market volatility. The stock market performance in January has been the weakest in history, but the environment is favorable for the bond market which benefits the District.

Trustee Reports

Trustee Kal Vaughn reported that he is pleased to serve on the presidential search committee and that the process is going well. He also thanked consultant Dr. Roe Darnell for his service to both the Presidential Search Committee and the selection committee to replace Executive Assistant to the Superintendent/President and Board of Trustees.

Board President Billy White reported that he and Trustee Manny Campos, along with Interim Superintendent/President Brock McMurray, attended the CCLC Legislative Conference that took place January 31 – February 1, 2016 in Sacramento. The group attended conference sessions and met with representatives of Senator Jean Fuller and Assemblywoman Shannon Grove. They plan to meet with the Senator and Assemblywoman personally later in the month. Academic Senate

Senate President Geoffrey Dyer reported that during the last month the Senate has addressed the Professional Development Charter; the IEPI/PRT Process; Foundation Grants; the potential SLO procedure and the TC Student Research Conference. The Senate approved a new constitution and bylaws; approved a policy for SLOs; activated a dual enrollment taskforce; voted to move ranking of new faculty positions to August inservice; created a taskforce to evaluate how the Senate ranks these requests; and, formed program discontinuation taskforces for DSE and recreation.

Vice President of Student Services Darcy Bogle reported that the College website project is moving along with the current focus on navigation and flow. The entire project will be completed and launched by the end of the spring semester. Faculty Association President Diane Jones reported that faculty members have begun their scheduling meetings for the summer and fall semesters. She added that she was pleased with the final Accreditation report.

Presidential Search Committee

Board Consultant Dr. Roe Darnell reported that the presidential search process is progressing well and the goal is to culminate the process in May in order for the Board to be able to formally approve a permanent Superintendent/President in June. The position announcement will be available on the search website on February 19th.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

2016 Report to the Community

Interim Superintendent/President Brock McMurray distributed copies of the 2016 Report to the Community which was previously mailed to Board members. He commended Dr. Dena Maloney's work on this project, along with the Institutional Research Office Coordinator Dr. Eric Bérubé and his staff.

Report from the Accrediting Commission for Community & Junior Colleges (ACCJC)

Mr. McMurray announced that he was very pleased to receive the official notification from ACCJC regarding the College's accreditation status which was outlined in a press release disseminated earlier in the day. The College received reaffirmation of accreditation for 18 months with the requirement of a follow-up report by March 15, 2017, and a site visit to evaluate the institution's work. The report indicated that the College did not meet standards in the following areas:

- 1. Integration of the assessment of course and program student learning outcomes (SLOs).
- 2. Submission of substantive change reports for the discontinuation of the automotive program and the re-establishment of the welding program which is offered at an off-site location.
- 3. Consistent assessment, analysis and evaluation of student learning outcomes for all academic programs and courses.
- 4. Communication of SLOs to students, including listing them consistently on all course syllabi and approved course outlines.

The College received the following commendations from the visiting team during their exit meeting:

- 1. TIL integration of TIL students into campus life in all areas.
- 2. Facilities Planning Grounds and development, buildings and overall environment.
- 3. Engagement with students all the programs available: Steps to Success, One Stop Shop, Counseling. A genuine commitment to success. A vibrant student life program.
- 4. Leadership Engagement of leadership planning process, integrated planning across campus, changes to Governance Council charter and institutional effectiveness.

Future Events

<u>Institutional Effectiveness Partnership Initiative (IEPI)</u> – This effort has been spearheaded by the Chancellor's Office to assist Colleges statewide with accreditation challenges. Teams of community college administrators and faculty members work with staff to improve their performance in SLOs and those links to accreditation. The original team visit at Taft College took place November 17, 2015. A second team visit is scheduled for February 22, 2016. Mr. McMurray has been working with Dr. Eric Bérubé and Geoffrey Dyer to develop a plan to integrate the College's SLOs into the planning and accreditation process.

Governance Council Retreat - The Governance Council Retreat is scheduled for Friday, February 26, 2016, at Stockdale Country Club in Bakersfield. The focus of the retreat is Accreditation and SLOs. Dr. Bob Pacheco, who is an authority on both subjects, will facilitate the retreat.

<u>Dental Hygiene Accreditation Site Visit</u> - The Dental Hygiene Accreditation site visit took place February 2nd and 3rd. The visit went well. As is typical, the team made several recommendations which will be implemented in the program in the near future.

<u>Phillips 66 Check Presentation</u> - On January 26th both local and regional representatives from Phillips 66 presented a donation of \$20,000 to the TC Foundation for use in the Energy Technology Program and K-14 STEM Outreach. The check presentation was held during a computer programming class in the ETEC building which was followed by a buffet lunch.

<u>Sheri Horn Bunk Named Taft Business Woman of the Year</u> - Congratulations to Foundation Executive Director Sheri Horn Bunk who has been named Taft Business Woman of the Year by the Taft Chamber of Commerce. Along with others, she will receive the award at the Chamber Installation Dinner on February 11th.

<u>Kern Economic Development Corporation</u> - Mr. McMurray announced that he attended a recent KEDC Board Meeting and will be oriented as a new member in a couple of weeks.

<u>Legislative Conference</u> - Lastly, Mr. McMurray, Board President Billy White and Trustee Emmanuel Campos attend the annual CCLC Legislative Conference in Sacramento January 31 – February 1, 2016. In addition to attending conference sessions, the group met with representatives of Senator Jean Fuller and Assemblywoman Shannon Grove. The group will also meet personally with Senator Fuller and Assemblywoman Grove later in the month.

NON-CREDIT VS. CREDIT LOADS

This Tentative Agreement ("Agreement") is made by and between the Taft College Faculty Association ("TCFA/CTA/NEA") and the West Kern Community College District ("District") (collectively referenced as the "parties") with respect to the following recitals:

As part of continuing dialogue through the Taft College Faculty Collective Bargaining Committee, the parties have reached a consensus for the purposes of calculating non-credit teacher load lecture hours.

Now, therefore, TCFA/CTA/NEA and the District hereby agree as follows:

- 1. The above recitals are true and correct.
- 2. The parties agree, effective and retroactive with the Fall 2015 semester, the teaching load lecture hours (credit or non-credit*) are calculated on a one-to-one (1:1) basis for the following non-credit* courses:
 - *0001 ESL Pre-level 1, 0010 ESL Level 1, 0020 ESL Level 2, 0030 ESL Level 3, 0040 ESL Level 4, 0050 ESL Level 5, 0090 ESL for Early Child Ed, LRSK 0910 Basic Academic Preparation, LRSK 0911 Basic Academic Preparation in Spanish, TUTR 0260 Supervised Tutoring, all ILS courses 0010 0077
- 3. The parties further agree Article 6, Workload Obligation, Section 6.1.1 of the collective bargaining agreement ("CBA") will be revised as follows:
 - 6.1.1 For the purposes of calculating the teaching load, lecture hours (credit or non-credit*) are calculated on a one-to-one (1:1) basis.
 - *0001 ESL Pre-level 1, 0010 ESL Level 1, 0020 ESL Level 2, 0030 ESL Level 3, 0040 ESL Level 4, 0050 ESL Level 5, 0090 ESL for Early Child Ed, LRSK 0910 Basic Academic Preparation, LRSK 0911 Basic Academic Preparation in Spanish, TUTR 0260 Supervised Tutoring, all ILS courses 0010 0077

Laboratory courses will be classified as a general laboratory or an extensive laboratory. An extensive laboratory is a course in which laboratory components require extensive workload efforts that are equivalent to workload efforts in a lecture course. Unless specifically identified as an extensive laboratory through the curriculum review process that is in place for the academic year, a laboratory course shall be identified as a general laboratory.

Non-Credit vs. Credit Loads - February 2016

- 4. Except as set forth in this Agreement, all other terms and conditions of the CBA shall remain unchanged.
- 5. This Agreement will become effective after ratification by the TCFA/CTA/NEA members and the District's Governing Board.

The attached tentative agreement memorializes the agreement between the Association and the District.

RETIREE HEALTH BENEFITS OPTION

This Tentative Agreement ("Agreement") is made by and between the Taft College Faculty Association ("TCFA/CTA/NEA") and the West Kern Community College District ("District") (collectively referenced as the "parties") with respect to the following recitals:

RECITALS

As part of continuing dialogue through the Taft College Faculty Collective Bargaining Committee, the parties have reached a consensus for the purposes of revising faculty retiree health benefits effective May 1, 2016.

AGREEMENT

Now, therefore, TCFA/CTA/NEA and the District hereby agree as follows:

- 1. The above recitals are true and correct.
- 2. The parties agree, effective May 1, 2016, the Article 7, Compensation, 7.2.4, Persons Entering the System, and 7.4, Retiree Health Benefits Program, of the collective bargaining agreement ("CBA") shall be modified to faculty member salary schedule placement and retiree health benefits revisions as follows:
- 7.2.4.1 Related experience (other than that referred to in 7.2.2) previous to employment by the West Kern Community College District shall be credited on the basis of year for year actual experience time up to six (6) up to eight (8) steps on the salary schedule.
- 7.4 <u>Retiree Health Benefits Program:</u> The District shall make a contribution for the health benefit program on behalf of a regular faculty member who has retired from District employment into the State Teachers Retirement System ("STRS") or Public Employees Retirement System ("PERS") as follows:

For the purpose of this Retiree Health Benefits Program, a "complete academic year" is a year in which the faculty member serves at least 75 percent of the number of instructional days within the District. A Board approved leave of absence shall not constitute a break in service with regard to an employee serving a complete academic year. The contribution shall be the same amount as the District's monthly health benefits program contribution for a regular faculty member who has not retired. (See Appendix F)

7.4.1

A regular faculty member hired on 8/16/2002, or thereafter through 4/30/2010 who was employed by the District for at least twenty (20) complete academic years and who is age 55 or older, or who was employed by the District for at least fifteen (15) complete academic years and who is age 60 or older and his/her eligible dependents shall be eligible to participate in a District paid health benefits program from the time of retirement for the life of the retiree. For the purpose of this Retiree Health Benefits Program, a "complete academic year" is a year in which the faculty member serves at least 75 percent of the number of instructional days within the District. A Board approved leave of absence shall not constitute a break in service with regard to an employee serving a complete academic year. The contribution shall be the same amount as the District's monthly health benefits program contribution for a regular faculty member who has not retired. (See Appendix F)

A regular faculty member hired on 5/1/2010, or thereafter through 4/30/2016 who was employed by the District for at least twenty (20) complete academic years and who is age 55 or older, or who was employed by the District for at least fifteen (15) complete academic years and who is age 60 or older and his/her eligible dependents shall be eligible to participate in a District paid health benefits program until the retiree reaches 65 years of age. For the purpose of this Retiree Health Benefits Program, a "complete academic year" is a year in which the faculty member serves at least 75 percent of the number of instructional days within the District. A Board approved leave of absence shall not constitute a break in service with regard to an employee serving a complete academic year. The contribution shall be the same amount as the District's monthly health benefits program contribution for a regular faculty member who has not retired. (See Appendix F)

A regular faculty member hired on 5/1/2016 or thereafter, who was employed by the District for at least twenty (20) complete academic years and his/her eligible dependents shall be eligible to participate in a District paid health benefits program for up to five (5) years or until the retiree reaches 65 years of age. In order to receive the health benefits a 2.5% annual premium is required. (Example: Current benefit package cost \$20,000. \$20,000 x .025 = \$500 per year or \$41.67 per month.) For the purpose of this Retiree Health Benefits Program, a "complete academic year" is a year in which the faculty member serves at least 75 percent of the number of instructional days within the District. A Board approved leave of absence shall not constitute a break in service with regard to an employee serving a complete academic year. The contribution shall be the same amount as the District's monthly health benefits program contribution for a regular faculty member who has not retired. Hire date is defined as the employee's first paid date of service. (See Appendix F)

Any regular faculty member who has retired from the District and is ineligible or becomes ineligible for District provided retiree benefits has the option to continue on the District health benefit program or the District supplemental program at the employee's cost.

7.4.3 All faculty members retiring between the ages of 55 to 63 have the option to opt out of retiree health benefits and receive a one-time cash incentive based on the current dollar amount for active employees as shown in the table below:

Taft College Classified School Employees Association Chapter #543 And West Kern Community College District

RETIREE HEALTH BENEFIT OPTION

This Tentative Agreement ("Agreement") is made by and between the Taft College Classified School Employees Association Chapter #543 and the West Kern Community College District ("District") (collectively referenced as the "parties") with respect to the following recitals:

As part of continuing dialogue through the Taft College Classified Collective Bargaining Committee, the parties have reached a consensus for the purposes revising Classified retiree health benefits effective May 1, 2016.

Now, therefore, CSEA Chapter #543 and the District hereby agree as follows:

- 1. The above recitals are true and correct.
- 2. The parties agree, effective May 1, 2016 retiree health benefits shall be modified as follows:

Article 18.3. Retiree Health Benefits Program

Offer all full-time classified employee members retiring between the ages of 55 to 63 the option to opt-out of retiree health benefits and receive a one-time cash incentive based on the current dollar amount for active employees as shown in the table below:

The following part of the option applies only to those Classified members hired on or after 5/1/2016.

New Hires with 20 years of service can qualify for up to five years of benefits under current package up to age 65. In order to receive the benefit a 2.5% annual premium co-pay is required. Hire date is defined as the employee's first paid date of service.

(Example: Benefit package cost \$20,000. $20,000 \times .025 = 500$ per year or \$41.67 per month.)

Attached is a copy of the West Kern Community College District's California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) for the quarter ended September 30, 2015. This report will be submitted to the Taft College Board of Trustees for their review at the regularly scheduled board meeting on March 9, 2016.

This report represents the first quarter of the 2015-2016 fiscal year. Total General Fund unrestricted revenues received to date were \$4,394,946 or 18.5% of the projected levels for the current fiscal year. General Fund unrestricted expenditures were \$4,843,260 or 20.4% of budgeted projections. The net effect was a year-to-date deficit of (\$448,314). The District estimated about 40% of its 2015-2016 apportioned funding would come in the form of apportionment payments. To date, the District has received almost 25% of budgeted apportionment amounts. This balanced receipt of apportionment funding offset with accelerated spending in areas for expenditures such as upfront payments for annual contracts, can be attributed to the year-to-date deficit.

Attached is a copy of the West Kern Community College District's California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office Financial Status Report (CCFS-311Q) for the period ended December 31, 2015. This report will be submitted to the Taft College Board of Trustees for their review at the regularly scheduled board meeting on March 9, 2016.

This report represents the first two quarters of the 2015-2016 fiscal year. Total General Fund unrestricted revenues received to date were \$10,645,927 or 44.8% of the projected levels for the current fiscal year. General Fund unrestricted expenditures were \$11,780,770 or 49.6% of budgeted projections. The net effect was a year-to-date deficit of (\$1,134,843). The District estimated about 40% of its 2015-2016 apportioned funding would come in the form of apportionment payments. To date, the District has received almost 50% of budgeted apportionment amounts. This balanced receipt of apportionment funding offset by slower than anticipated receipt of property tax funding, can be attributed to the year-to-date deficit.



Master Agreement for ASL Interpreting Services

Recitals

- A. ILCKC maintains a registry of qualified ASL interpreters who abide by the National Registry of Interpreters, Code of Ethics that govern performance.
- B. Customer has or may have the need from time to time for Services.
- C. ILCKC and Customer wish to enter into this Agreement for Services on the terms and conditions set forth below.

Agreement

- 1. <u>Scope of Services</u>: ILCKC, through employees and/or independent contractors, shall provide to Customer, pursuant to the terms and conditions set forth below, American Sign Language Interpreting Services consisting of one or more interpreters personally present at a location designated by Customer to provide interpretation of spoken word to sign language and sign language to spoken word.
- 2. <u>Fees, scheduling, reimbursement, cancellation, payment and other terms for the Services</u>: The fees to be paid for the Services, reimbursement, cancellation, and other terms for the Services are set forth in Attachment "A" and are hereby made a part of this Agreement. The content of Attachment "A" may be changed from time to time upon mutual agreement of ILCKC and Customer.
- 3. <u>Term and Termination</u>: This Agreement is effective immediately upon date of Customer's signature and will remain in effect for a period of one (1) year. At the end of this initial term, this Agreement shall automatically renew on a yearly basis unless either party notifies the other in writing of no extension. Either party may give a thirty (30) days prior written notice to terminate the Agreement, without cause.



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- 4. <u>Independent Contractor Status</u>: ILCKC, its agents and employees, shall act as and be considered independent contractor(s) in the performance of this Agreement and not as officers or employees of Customer. As such, ILCKC shall invoice for the Services as set forth in Attachment "A". Further, ILCKC shall be responsible for all employment related taxes for persons it hires to perform the Services.
- 5. <u>Prohibition Against Solicitation for Direct Hire</u>: Customer agrees that it will not solicit to hire any person who has provided Services to Customer through this Agreement within 6 months after such person has last provided Services to the Customer pursuant to this Agreement.
- 6. <u>Confidentiality</u>: All knowledge and information expressly identified by Customer in writing as confidential and which is acquired by ILCKC and/or the interpreter(s) hired by ILCKC to perform the Services shall be maintained in confidentiality by ILCKC and/or the hired interpreter(s) and, except as expressly authorized by Customer in writing, shall not be divulged or published by ILCKC and/or the interpreter(s). Confidential information for purposes of this paragraph shall not include information which is or becomes available to the general public (other than through a breach of this paragraph) and shall not include information subject to disclosure under in State or federal public information or disclosure law.
- 7. <u>Audio and Video Recording of Services</u>: ILCKC, on its own behalf and on behalf of the interpreter(s) hired by ILCKC to perform the Services, consent to the audio and video recording of the Services performed by the interpreter(s) to the extent that such audio and video recordings are for the sole use of Customer and shall not be further distributed. This limitation shall not apply to audio and video recordings during public meetings of governmental bodies.

2. ADDITIONAL TERMS OF SERVICE

- A. <u>Minimum charge</u>: Each interpreting job shall be scheduled at a 2-hour minimum with the time starting upon the interpreter's arrival at the customer's location.
- B. <u>Scheduling</u>: Interpreting services shall be scheduled for specific starting and ending times. In the event that the interpreter is released prior to the scheduled ending time, the customer shall be invoiced for the entire time scheduled.
- C. <u>Added Time</u>: In certain circumstances, a customer may find it necessary to request additional interpreting time after a scheduled job has begun. In such an event, ILCKC may provide such additional time, subject to acceptance of the additional time by the interpreter(s) already on the job at the customer's location. Additional time shall be invoiced in full one (1) hour increments for each hour that the interpreter(s) is/are at the customer's location.
- D. <u>Multiple Interpreters</u>: ILCKC, in its sole and absolute discretion, reserves the right to assign more than one interpreter to a job. Such assignments may be made with respect

to certain jobs over 1 hours in length (classes, seminars, meetings, and other events that do not allow for intermittent breaks.) In the event that more than one interpreter is

assigned to a job, the customer shall be invoiced for each interpreter for the entire scheduled time of the job, notwithstanding that one interpreter may be on a break.

- E. <u>Travel Time:</u> Travel time pay for interpreting services in excess of 30 miles one-way will be discussed on a case by case basis.
- F. <u>Mileage and Miscellaneous Reimbursements</u>: In the event that the location at which the interpreting services will be provided is more than 20 miles (round trip) from the ILCKC headquarters, customer shall pay to ILCKC mileage at the maximum reimbursement rate announced from time to time by the Internal Revenue Service.

 Miscellaneous Reimbursements, including but not limited to, parking fees and tolls, shall be reimbursed to ILCKC at actual cost.
- G. Changes and Cancellations: Twenty-four (24) hours advance written notice is required for all cancellations, location changes, and changes to the scheduled length of services to be provided. Jobs scheduled that are cancelled with less than 48 hours advance notice will be invoiced to the customer for the scheduled hours, at the applicable rate (general, after hours, or emergency), plus any mileage and miscellaneous reimbursements actually incurred by the interpreter(s). Tenant shall save the Landlord and hold it harmless from any expense, loss or damage to the Premises by reason of Tenant's violation of such laws, regulations, rules and ordinances as of the date of this Lease, or by reason of any damage to the Premises that is sustained by reason of the Tenant's negligence.
- 6. Tenant shall take care that no damage occurs to the buildings or any fixtures upon the Premises as a result of Tenant's use of the Premises, and Tenant shall be liable for all damages to the Premises caused by Tenant or its agents. Tenant agrees to observe all valid rules and regulations of the utility companies and the sewer authority supplying the Premises with electricity, gas, water and use of sewer, and Tenant shall promptly pay bills for the same during the Lease term.
- 7. Tenant shall return the Premises to Landlord upon the termination of this Lease in the same condition as when taken, reasonable wear and tear excepted, and except for improvements remaining with the Premises as described herein.
- 8. Landlord represents and warrants that as of the date of this Lease the Premises is fully compliant with all applicable Federal, State, County and Municipal laws, regulations, rules and ordinances, and that the lease of the Premises to Tenant does not violate the


same. Landlord further represents and warrants that as of the date of this Lease the Premises is being used and maintained in accordance with all valid rules and regulations of the utility companies and the sewer authority supplying the Premises with electricity, gas, water and use of sewer. Landlord shall be responsible for the transfer of all bills for electricity, gas, water and sewer into Tenant's name as of the date this Lease commences, at which time Tenant's obligation to pay the same shall begin.

- 9. Landlord shall be responsible for capital improvements, repairs and maintenance for the Premises including, but not limited to, maintenance, repairs, and replacement as necessary of the HVAC system, electrical wiring, roof, parking area, exterior walls and structural foundation, and plumbing with the exception of plugged drains and toilets.
- 10. If Tenant fails to pay rent when due, or to perform any term of this Lease, after not less than thirty (30) days' written notice of default given to Tenant in the manner set forth in this Lease, Landlord, at Landlord's option, may terminate all rights of Tenant under this Lease, unless Tenant, within the time specified, cures the default. Either Landlord or Tenant may terminate this Lease for any reason after not less than six (6) months' written notice to the other in the manner set forth in this Lease.
- 11. If Tenant defaults, Landlord may elect to: (a) continue the lease in effect, and enforce all Landlord's rights and remedies under this Lease, including the right to recover the rent as it becomes due; or (b) at any time, terminate all of Tenant's rights under this Lease, and recover from Tenant all damages Landlord may incur by reason of the breach of the Lease, including the cost of recovering the Premises and including the worth at the time of the termination or at the time of an award if suit is instituted to enforce this provision, of the amount by which the unpaid rent for the balance of the term exceeds the amount of the rental loss that Tenant proves could be reasonably voided.
- 12. In the event of a partial destruction of the Premises during the Lease term, Landlord shall forthwith repair the same, provided that such repairs are being made within sixty (60) days under existing governmental laws and regulations, but such partial destruction shall not terminate this Lease, except that Tenant shall be entitled to a proportionate reduction of rent while such repairs are being made, based upon the extent to which the making of such repairs shall interfere with the business of Tenant on the Premises. If such repairs of partial destruction cannot be made within said sixty (60) days, or in the event that Landlord fails to make such repairs within sixty (60) days, this Lease may be terminated immediately at the option of either party by written notice. In the event of the total destruction of the Premises, or so much damage as to render the Premises untenable for Tenant's business on the Premises, either party hereto may serve personally, or by registered mail, upon the other party within ten (10) days after such destruction, a thirty (30) day written notice of the intention of such party to terminate this Lease and the term therein provided for and at the end of such thirty days the Tenant shall pay all rent to the date of said destruction and surrender up to the Landlord the Premises and this Lease shall terminate.
- 13. All express covenants made by the Landlord to Tenant in connection with the Premises are contained in this Lease.

- 14. All improvements made by the Tenant to or upon the Premises shall remain on the Premises of the Landlord at the expiration of the Lease if not removed by Tenant. Tenant is expressly allowed to install a ventilation system on the Premises, and agrees to remove the ventilation system and associated infrastructure upon the termination of this Lease and return the Premises to a condition reasonably similar to its condition prior to the installation of the ventilation system. Other improvements made by Tenant beyond the ventilation system shall remain in place at the end of the lease, unless mutually agreed otherwise.
- 15. Landlord shall furnish the following utilities: None. Tenant is responsible for all utilities.
- 16. Late charges of \$175.00 will be added to the rent for rental payments made after the fifth of the month.
- 17. For the duration of the Lease, Tenant, at its expense, shall insure Tenant and Landlord by maintaining insurance against liability for injury to persons or property in connection with the entire Premises with a comprehensive general public liability insurance policy with limits of at least one (1) million dollars with respect to injury or death of any one (1) person and two (2) million dollars with respect to any one (1) accident, disaster or occurrence, and one hundred thousand dollars with respect to property damage. Tenant shall provide Landlord with a certificate of insurance prior to the commencement date of the term of this Lease, evidencing such coverage and Landlord's status as an additional insured. Tenant, at his expense, shall insure buildings for fire damages at replacement cost.
- 18. Any notice upon Landlord or Tenant required or permitted to be given under this Lease shall be in writing and shall be deemed to have been duly and sufficiently given if a copy thereof has been personally delivered or mailed by United States registered or certified mail, postage prepaid to Tenant at 29 Cougar Court, Taft, CA 93268, and to Landlord at P.O. Box 344, Taft, CA 93268. Any notice required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be deemed effective upon receipt or failure to accept delivery. Notice of any change in address shall be given as set forth in this Paragraph.
- 19. Landlord shall have the right to enter the Premises for the purposes of making necessary or agreed repairs and for showing the Premises to prospective tenants, purchasers, or mortgagees, provided that, except in the case of an emergency, such entry shall be made during normal business hours and upon at least thirty-six (36) hours' prior notice to Tenant. Tenant may not change the locks to the Leased Premises without the prior consent of Landlord, and Landlord shall be provided by Tenant with a working key to the locks if the change is allowed.


