# <u>Criminal Justice Administration (CJA) 1058 PC 832 Firearms Training (1.5 unit per semester; limit 6 units)</u>

[Formerly Criminal Justice Administration 58ABCD]

Prerequisite: Successful completion of CJA 1057 with a passing grade

\*SPECIAL NOTICE: Per Penal Code section 13511.5, students must obtain written clearance from the California Department of Justice verifying that they are not prohibited from possessing firearms.

Prerequisite Knowledge/Skills: Before entering the course, the student should be able to:

- 1. Describe the role of law enforcement in the community,
- 2. Describe the levels of crimes.
- 3. Describe the legal requirements for making an arrest,
- 4. Identify and describe the elements of certain crimes against the justice system,
- 5. Effectively use legal terminology in the description and explanation of the laws of search and seizure,
- 6. Demonstrate a balanced stance,
- 7. Demonstrate the position of interview,
- 8. Demonstrate a control hold,
- 9. Demonstrate a takedown,
- 10. Demonstrate the proper application of handcuffs,
- 11. Demonstrate appropriate search of a person for weapons, and
- 12. Analyze and recall related statutes.

Total Hours: 24 hours lecture

Course Description: This course covers the competencies required for certification by Peace Officer Standards and Training (POST) for Penal Code section 832 Firearms. This course includes engagement in the use of firearms: which will include handgun familiarization, safety, care, cleaning and storage, and firearms range qualifications. This course is offered as pass/no pass basis only. Only 1.5 units can be applied towards an Associate degree.

Course Objectives:

By the end of the course a successful student will be able to:

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to properly use the service handgun and pass a course designed by POST,
- 2. Describe and demonstrate the safe handling of a firearm,
- 3. Describe and practice range safety,
- 4. Follow range commands and safety rules,
- 5. Describe the cleaning and proper storage of a firearm,
- 6. Demonstrate loading and unloading a firearm,
- 7. Describe and demonstrate handgun shooting principles,
- 8. Describe and demonstrate combat shooting principles,
- 9. Demonstrate practical aspects of combat firing, and
- 10. Evaluate and describe the exercise of discretion in the application of the use of deadly force.

# Learning Activities Required Outside of Class

The students in this class will spend a minimum of 3 hours per week outside of the regular class time doing the following:

- 1. The student will have to practice the techniques taught to maintain proficiency with their firearm.
- 2. Care and cleaning of firearm
- 3. Storage and transportation of a firearm
- 4. Students will prepare a written summary of the skills learned.

# Methods of Instruction

- 1. Lecture
- 2. Demonstration
- 3. Class discussions and participation
- 4. Audiovisual presentations and practical exercises
- 5. Experience:
  - a. Safety rules
  - b. Functioning and Firing of the firearm
  - c. Firearm shooting principles



- d. Care and Cleaning
- e. Storage of a firearm
- f. Extensive practice in live fire exercises (one-on-one instruction/small groups)

# Methods of Evaluation

- 1. Class Presentation
  - a. Students will demonstrate safety and competence with dry fire exercises.
- 2. Students must pass a performance exam demonstrating proficiency with live fire exercises at the range.
- 3. Students must pass a live fire exercise, determined by POST with a passing grade.
