Catalog Description: This course examines the basic responsibilities, techniques and methods of police patrol and operations, including theories of patrol, goals, patrol environment, hazards, community-oriented policing, and problem-oriented policing. In addition, this course analyzes patrol supervision, staffing and deployment, special issues in patrol operations, upgrading the patrol function, traffic enforcement, the handling of criminal activity, report writing as well as ethics in law enforcement.

- 4. Investigate and appraise current issues in the patrol function and their impact on a law enforcement agency/officer, and
- 5. Investigate and evaluate the importance of proper supervision in the patrol function as it relates to officer performance, professionalism and ethics.
