### Independent Living Skills (ILS) 0017 Interpersonal Relationships Level 3 (0 Units)

Prerequisite: Successful completion in Independent Living Skills 0016

Prerequisite knowledge and skills: Before entering the course, the student should be able to

- 1. identify male and female sexual body parts,
- 2. understand basic hygiene and personal care of the male and female body,
- 3. discuss moral values and how they affect sexual choices,
- 4. explain the changes that male and female bodies undergo from birth to death,
- 5. explain the difference between private and public environments,
- 6. identify sexual behaviors that are appropriate or inappropriate in public,
- 7. explain how conception takes place and how babies are born,
- 8. identify the physiological changes that take place before, during, and after sexual intercourse,
- 9. explain the act of sexual intercourse,
- 10. identify sexual practices that may harm males or females,
- 11. identify current methods of birth control,
- 12. explain the purpose and necessity of using condoms,
- 13. demonstrate how to apply a condom,
- 14. explain that abstinence is the only birth control that is 100% guaranteed to prevent pregnancy,
- 15. explain basic issues of abortion,
- 16. identify sexually-transmitted diseases and how one contracts an STD,
- 17. explain the term "safe sex,"
- 18. recognize sexual abuse,
- 19. identify strategies to prevent sexual abuse,
- 20. explain how to get help if sexually abused,
- 21. explain legal ramifications of committing sexual abuse,
- 22. explain what must happen if one partner says no at any time, and
- 23. explain the legal ramifications of an adult engaging in sex with a minor.

Total Hours: 16 hours lecture

Catalog Description: This course covers inter-relationships with other people, including family, friends, and coworkers. The focus of the class is on building a successful marriage and other personal relationships. The class avoids intellectual jargon in favor of easy-to-follow concepts from which anyone can benefit.
