By the end of the course, a successful student will be able to:

- 1. understand and appreciate jazz as an American artform,
- 2. explain the history and popularity of jazz,
- 3. recognize different styles of jazz, and
- 4. apply their knowledge and listening skills in a concert setting

Course Scope and Content:

Unit I Overview of Jazz

- A. Defining jazz in terms of styles and techniques
- B. Exploring the use of improvisation in the genre
- C. Identify different styles of jazz including Dixieland, Swing, Bebop, and Cool

Unit II Historical Origins and Influences

- A. Examine early beginnings of the movement
- B. Understand how each style changed jazz
- C. Recognize the different tones found in various influences
- D. Trace the evolution of brass bands and Ragtime

Unit III Early Jazz Period

A. Listen to string bands



- B. Understand syncopation and how it develops unique styles
- C. Explore rhythms and find them in various jazz techniques
- D. Listen to and compare March Music and Ragtime

Unit IV Swing Era

- A. Listen to vocal blues to identify vocal techniques used in them
- B. Find "ornaments of pitch" commonly used in jazz
- C. Identify and compare tone qualities between different sizes of jazz groups
- D. Explore use of instruments and sounds found in Swing Bands

Unit V Cool Jazz Style

- A. Research the origins of Cool Jazz
- B. Listen to and compare masters of the style
 - 1. Dave Brubeck
 - 2. Stan Kenton
 - 3. Gerry Mulligan

Unit VI Avant Garde Jazz- The Latest Styles

- A. Explore techniques found in modern Jazz
 - 1. Examine the elements of free form
 - 2. Identify "difficult chords"
 - 3. Listen for tempo changes
 - 4. Discuss how amplification and electronic instruments contribute to Jazz
- B. Distinguish between types of Modern Jazz
 - 1. Learn the elements of Jazz/Rock
 - 2. Explain the styles and techniques used in Fusion
