Make a Point /Topic	
Often, the point is the TOPIC SENTENCE. • What is the point of this paragraph? • What claim is being made? • What will this paragraph prove or discuss?	
Information/Quote	
The information is the EVIDENCE used to support/develop the point. • How is the point supported with specific data, experiences, or other factual material? • What examples can you use to support your point? Ideas for What Kind of INFORMATION You Should Include: • Facts, details, reasons, examples • Information from the readings or class discussions • Paraphrases or short quotations • Statistics, polls, percentages, data from research studies • Personal experience, stories, anecdotes, examples from your life	
Explanation	
The explanation is the writer's ANALYSIS, elaboration, evaluation, or interpretation of the point and information given, connecting the information with the point (topic sentence) and the thesis. • What does the provided information mean? • How does it relate to your overall argument? • Why is this information important/ significant/meaningful?
